#### INTRODUCTION

The National Programme for Implementation of the SAA (NPISAA) 2022-2026 was approved by the Government of the Republic of Kosovo on 9 March 2022 and adopted by the Assembly of the Republic of Kosovo on 7 April 2022. It is a legally binding document for all state administration bodies, which are obliged to implement short-term measures under their responsibility, as planned. The Government, as the central national mechanism responsible for the fulfilment of SAA obligations, oversees the implementation of the NPISAA through the institution legally mandated to coordinate the EU integration process - Office of the Prime Minister (OPM). The OPM, through the departments responsible for European integration, monitors the implementation of the NPISAA, on quarterly basis through regular reports. These reports serve to evaluate and improve the implementation of this programme and for accountability and transparency within the institutions and to other stakeholders and the general public. The findings are discussed, inter alia, by the Government Cabinet and the EU – Kosovo Stabilisation and Association bodies, responsible for overseeing the implementation of the SAA.

This first report for 2022 covers the period 1 January – 31 March. The data are reported by each responsible institution through the *Online Monitoring and Reporting Platform for European Integration* as per the matrix of short-term measures and based on the respective manual. In the chapters where data were reported late or inadequately, they were not included in the report and the relevant measures were assessed as not fully implemented, respectively facing serious delays. Implementation of the Programme is evaluated according to the performance status (presented in charts) and in two levels: for all measures and for the measures planned to be implemented within the reporting period (January – March).

The implementation of all measures is assessed according to five levels of progress of implementation:

- Completed measures (those that are fully implemented) with *blue*;
- Measures under implementation, without delays (implementation has started and are expected to be fully implemented within the foreseen deadlines) with green;
- Measures with minor delays (implementation has started, but face slight delays and problems) with <u>yellow</u>;
- Measures with serious delays (envisaged to be implemented during the reporting period, but the implementation has not started yet, and face serious delays) with red; and
- Measures planned for the future (implementation has not started yet and are planned to be implemented in the remaining part of the year) in grey.

The implementation of the measures planned to be implemented within the reporting period is assessed according to two levels of progress of implementation:

- Implemented measures (those which are fully implemented) with *blue*; and
- Unimplemented measures (those which have not been implemented) with rea.

Further, this report contains four chapters and is divided into two sections: the section on the Programme as a whole and the section on each block. Chapter 0 provides a general overview on state of play, until the end of March, in the implementation of the Programme as a whole, compared with the whole year and within the reporting period. This chapter is further divided into five sections: the section on the Programme as a whole, the section on political criteria, the section on economic criteria, the section on European standards, and the section on institutions. Each part of this chapter contains the chart and the narrative section (elaboration of findings). The narrative text on each block concludes with a qualitative assessment of the state of play, summarizing the measures that have not been implemented within the reporting period and those that are expected to face challenges during the following period.

Chapters 1, 2 and 3 are uniform - each containing two sections for each chapter of the Programme: the chart and the narrative part. The charts present the findings on the level of implementation of the relevant chapter, one *until the end of the reporting period* (compared to all the measures of the chapter) and the other *during the reporting period* (for the measures planned to be implemented within the period January-March). The narrative part gives a quantitative summary of these findings. The section on implementation until the end of the reporting period gives the number and percentage of measures implemented and those with


other statuses of implementation out of all measures planned. The section on implementation within the first quarter gives the number and percentage of measures implemented out of measures planned to be implemented within this quarter. The narrative section also gives a brief qualitative assessment of the overall state of affairs in the relevant area. The report also contains an annex that presents the state of implementation of all measures.

The findings indicate that within the first quarter of this year, the Programme has been implemented at a level of 29.63%: 8 out of 27 measures planned for this quarter have been fully implemented, while 70.27% of them, 19 measures, have not been fully implemented yet (see chart 0.2., p. 6). Moreover, until the end of the first quarter the entire Programme has been implemented at a level of 7.23%: 17 out of 235 planned measures have been implemented, while 92.77% of them (218 measures) have not been fully implemented yet. Of these 17 measures, 9 of them have been implemented ahead of schedule (see the annex of report).

## 0. GENERAL OVERVIEW ON IMPLEMENTATION OF NPISAA DURING JANUARY - MARCH 2022

The Programme contains 235 measures: 89 (37.87%) legislative measures and 146 (62.13%) implementing measures.

Chart 0.1. Implementation of NPISAA during January – March 2022: all measures.




Regarding implementation of the Programme until the end of the first quarter, findings indicate as follows:

- 7.23% of measures, 17 measures, have been fully implemented;
- 66.81% of measures, 157 measures, are under implementation, as planned;
- 12.34% of measures, 29 measures, face slight delays;
- 8.51% of measures, 20 measures, face serious delays;
- 5.11% of measures, 12 measures, are planned to be implemented during the remainder of the year.

Of the total 17 measures fully implemented, 9 measures (52.94% of them) were implemented ahead of deadlines (for details, see the annex to the report).

Of all the measures of the Programme, 27 measures (11.48% of them) were planned to be implemented during the first quarter: 16 legislative measures (59.25%) and 11 implementing measures (40.75%).

Chart 0.2. Implementation of NPISAA during January - March 2022: measures planned for this quarter




Regarding implementation of the measures planned to be implemented during the first quarter, findings indicate as follows:

- 29.63% of measures, 8 measures, have been fully implemented;
- 70.37% of measures, 19 measures, have not yet been fully implemented, i.e. they face serious delays.

Out of 235 measures in total, the Programme contains 89 legislative measures, which constitute 37.87% of all measures.

Chart 0.3. Implementation of NPISAA during January - March 2022: all legislative measures




Regarding the implementation of legislative measures, until the end of the first quarter, findings indicate as follows:

- 6.74% of measures, 6 measures, have been fully implemented;
- 62.92% of measures, 56 measures, are under implementation, as planned;
- 12.36% of measures, 11 measures, face slight delays;
- 16.85% of measures, 15 measures, face serious delays;
- 1.12% of measures, 1 measure, are planned to be implemented during the remainder of the year.

Of all these legislative measures, 16 measures (17.97%) of them were planned to be implemented during the first quarter.

Chart 0.4. Implementation of NPISAA during January – March 2022: legislative measures planned for the first quarter.




Regarding the implementation of legislative measures planned to be implemented within the first quarter, findings indicate as follows:

- 12.50% of measures, 2 measures, have been fully implemented;
- 87.50% of measures, 14 measures, have not yet been fully implemented, i.e. they face serious delays.

Out of a total of 235 measures, the Programme contains 146 implementing measures, which constitute 62.13% of all measures.


Chart 0.5. Implementation of NPISAA during January - March 2022: all implementing measures



Regarding the implementation of the implementing measures until the end of the first quarter, findings indicate as follows:

- 7.53% of measures, 11 measures, have been fully implemented;
- 69.18% of measures, 101 measures, are under implementation, as planned;
- 12.33% of measures, 18 measures, face slight delays;
- 3.42% of measures, 5 measures, face serious delays;
- 7.53% of measures, 11 measures, are planned to be implemented during the remainder of the year.

Chart 0.6. Implementation of NPISAA during January – March 2022: implementing measures planned for the first quarter




Regarding implementation of implementing measures planned to be implemented during the first quarter, findings indicate as follows:

- 54.55% of measures, 6 measures, have been fully implemented;
- 45.45% of measures, 5 measures, have not yet been fully implemented, i.e. they face serious delays.

## 0.1. State of Play by Blocks: Political Criteria

This block contains 17 measures: 4 (23.52%) legislative measures and 13 (76.47%) implementing measures.

Chart 0.1.1. Implementation of NPISAA during January - March 2022: Political Criteria - all measures




Regarding the implementation of this block until the end of the first quarter, findings indicate as follows:

• 5.88% of measures, 1 measure, is fully implemented;

- 52.94% of measures, 9 measures, are under implementation, as planned;
- 29.41% of measures, 5 measures, face serious delays;
- 11.76% of measures, 2 measures, are planned to be implemented during the remainder of the year.

Of all measures of this block, 5 (29.41% of them) were planned to be implemented during the first quarter: 4 legislative measures and 1 (20% of them) implementing measure.

Regarding the implementation of measures planned to be implemented during the first quarter, findings indicate that none of the 4 planned measures has not been fully implemented, i.e. they face serious delays.


Based on the findings of this Report, the measures of this block planned for the reporting period which have not been implemented within the foreseen deadline are the following:

- Adoption of the rules of procedure of the Assembly of the Republic of Kosovo;
- Approval by the Government of the draft-law on salaries in the public sector;
- Approval by the Government of the draft-law on public officials;
- Approval by the Government of the draft-law on administrative inspection;
- Harmonization with the LGAP of at least 20% of existing laws, draft-laws, bylaws and Administrative Instructions that contain special administrative procedures and are part of the legislative program.

## 0.2. State of Play by Blocks: Economic Criteria

This block contains 3 implementing measures; no measures were planned to be implemented during the first quarter.

Regarding implementation of this block until the end of the first quarter, findings indicate as follows::

- 66.67% of measures, 2 measures, are under implementation, as planned;
- 33.33% of measures, 1 measure, face serious delays.


The measure of this block that is expected to face challenges and delays and that requires attention for the rest of the year is as follows:

• Adoption of the Concept Document on amending the Law on Public Owned Enterprises.

# 0.3. State of Play by Block: European Standards - Approximation of Kosovo's Legislation with the EU Acquis

This block contains 215 measures: 85 (39.53%) legislative measures and 130 (60.46%) implementing measures.

Chart 0.3.1. Implementation of NPISAA during January - March 2022: European Standards - all measures




Regarding the implementation of this block until the end of the first quarter, findings indicate as follows:

- 7.44% of measures, 16 measures, have been fully implemented;
- 67.91% of measures, 146 measures, are under implementation, as planned;
- 13.02% of measures, 28 measures, face slight delays;
- 6.98% of measures, 15 measures, face serious delays;
- 4.65% of measures, 10 measures, are planned to be implemented during the remainder of the year.

Of all measures in this block, 22 (10.23% of them) were planned to be implemented during the first quarter: 12 (54.54%) legislative measures and 10 (45.46%) implementing measures.

Chart 0.3.2. Implementation of NPISAA during January – March 2022: European Standards – measures planned for this quarter.



Regarding the implementation of measures planned to be implemented during the first quarter, findings indicate as follows:

- 36.36% of measures, 8 measures, have been fully implemented;
- 63.64% of measures, 14 measures, have not yet been fully implemented, i.e. they face serious delays.

Based on the findings of this report, the measures of this block planned for the reporting period which failed to be implemented within the deadline are the following:

- Adoption of Regulation on the Protection of Children and Minors in Audio and Audiovisual Media Services;
- Adoption of Regulation for Dispute Resolution;
- Adoption of the Programme for Agriculture and Rural Development 2022-2028;
- Adoption of AI on setting health rules for animal by-products and their derived products not intended for human consumption;
- Adoption of AI for technical control of vehicles;

- Adoption of AI for mobile technical control;
- Adoption of the plan concerning the vulnerable consumers safeguards (electricity).
- Revision of the national science programme;
- Adoption of the strategic plan for prevention and control of communicable diseases;
- Amending the AI on the conditions, ways, parameters and limiting values of wastewater discharge in the public sewerage network and in the water body;
- Adoption of the Action Plan 2022-2024 on the strategy for the development of the forestry sector 2022-2030.

The measures of this block that are expected to face challenges and delays and that require attention during the remainder of the year are the following:

- Adoption of the concept document on the prevention of money laundering and combating terrorist financing;
- Establishment of a special team or organizational unit in the FIU-K for strategic analysis;
- Drafting of an analysis of the compatibility of the existing platform with the requirements of the EU Business Registry System (BRIS);
- Data collection from the field within the process of census of population and housing 2022;
- Approval by the Government of the draft-law on labour;
- Approval by the Government of the draft-law amending the Law No. 04 / L-161 on Safety and Health at Work;
- Implementation of at least three (3) projects in the sectors of informal employment, accommodation / restaurants, and inventory of goods;
- *Adoption of the tourism strategy;*
- Adoption of policy for industry development and business support;
- Approval by the Government of the draft-law on the State Prosecutor;
- Approval by the Government of the draft-law on administrative disputes;
- *Appointment of two (2) members of the KPC;*
- Recruitment of seven (7) mediation officers in the basic prosecution offices;
- Adoption of the Strategy on the Protection and Promotion of the Rights of Communities and their Members;
- Approval by the Government of the draft-law on cybersecurity;
- Adoption of the guide for the operationalisation of the Central Migration Authority.
- Adoption of the strategy on Industrial Property;
- *Implementation of collective licensing agreements;*
- Drafting of AI on the implementation of exemption from payment of premiums, co-payments and co-financing for health services;
- Adoption of the Health Sector Strategy 2022-2032;
- Approval by the Government of the draft customs and excise code in Kosovo (amendment).

## 0.4. State of Play by Institutions

This section provides an overview of the progress of implementation of the Programme for institutions that have planned implementation of activities during the period January – March. In order to evaluate the performance, the institutions are ranked by percentage of measures implemented, from the one with the worst performance to the one with the best performance.




Chart 0.4.1. Implementation of NPISAA during January - March 2022: performance of Government institutions

Regarding the performance of Government institutions in implementing the measures under their responsibility, planned to be implemented during the period January – March 2022, findings indicate as follows:

- Ministry of Education, Science, Technology and Innovation (MESTI) 0% (0/1 measures implemented);
- Ministry of Health (MoH) 0% (0 / 1 measures implemented);
- Ministry of Environment, Spatial Planning and Infrastructure (MESPI) 0% (0/3 measures implemented;
- *Ministry of Internal Affairs (MIA) 20% (1/5 measures implemented);*
- Ministry of Agriculture, Forestry and Rural Development (MAFRD) 60% (3/5 measures implemented);
- *Ministry of Economy (MoE) 100% (1/1 measures implemented).*
- *Ministry of Justice (MoD) 100% (1/1 measures implemented);*
- Ministry of Industry, Entrepreneurship and Trade (MIET) 100% (1/1 measures implemented).

The performance of the rest of the Government institutions during the period January - March cannot be measured, as no measure under their responsibility is planned to be implemented within this period.




Chart 0.4.2. Implementation of NPISAA during January - March 2022: performance of other institutions

On the other hand, in terms of the performance of other institutions in implementing the measures under their responsibility planned to be implemented during the period January - March, findings indicate as follows:

- Kosovo Food and Veterinary Agency (KFVA) 0% (0/1 measures implemented);
- Independent Media Commission (IMC) 0% (0/1 measures implemented);
- Assembly of the Republic of Kosovo 0% (0/1 measures implemented);
- *Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) 0% (0 / 4 measures implemented);*
- Regulatory Authority of Electronic and Postal Communications (RAEPC) 50% (1 / 2 measures implemented).

The performance of the rest of the other institutions during the period January - March cannot be measured, as no measure under their responsibility is planned to be implemented within this period.

#### 1. BLOCK 1: POLITICAL CRITERIA

#### 1.1. Democracy and the Rule of Law

#### 1.1.1. Constitution, Parliament and Electoral System

This chapter contains 2 measures: 1 (50%) legislative measure and 1 (50%) implementing measure.

Chart 1.1.2.1. Implementation of NPISAA during January – March 2022: Constitution, Parliament and Electoral System – all measures



Regarding the implementation of this chapter until the end of the first quarter, the findings indicate as follows:

- 50% of measures, 1 measure, is under implementation, as planned;
- 50% of measures, 1 measure, face serious delays. This measure is as follows:
  - o Adoption of the regulation of the Assembly of the Republic of Kosovo.

Of all measures in this chapter, 1 legislative measure (50%) was planned to be implemented during the first quarter.

Chart 1.1.2.2. Implementation of NPISAA during January – March 2022: Constitution, Parliament and Electoral System – measures planned for this quarter




Regarding implementation of measures planned to be implemented during the first quarter, findings indicate that 1 measure planned, has not yet been implemented, i.e. it faces with serious delays.

As the findings of the report indicate, the Parliamentary Committee on Legislation, Mandates, and Immunities is in the process of reviewing the draft regulation. On February 22, 2022, the Assembly approved in principle the new Rules of Procedure of the Assembly. Pursuant to Article 57 of the Rules of Procedure of the Assembly, the Working Group may not start its work without the expiration of the deadline for submission of amendments, which is two working weeks after its approval in principle. Whereas the ad-hoc Committee and the Advisory Group of the Assembly was established during April 2022, therefore it will be reported as completed in the next reporting period.

#### 1.1.2. Public Administration

This chapter contains 13 measures: 3 (23%) legislative measures and 10 (76%) implementing measures.

Chart 1.1.2.1. Implementation of NPISAA during January - March 2022: Public Administration - all measures



Regarding the implementation of this chapter until the end of the first quarter, findings indicate as follows:

- 7.69% of measures, 1 measure, have been fully implemented;
- 46.15% of measures, 6 measures, are under implementation, as planned;
- 30.77% of measures, 4 measures, face serious delays. These measures are the following:
  - o Approval by the Government of the draft-law on salaries in the public sector;
  - o Approval by the Government of the draft-law on public officials;
  - Approval by the Government of the draft-law on administrative inspection;
  - Harmonization with the Law on General Administrative Procedure (LGAP) of at least 20% of existing laws, draft-laws and bylaws that contain special administrative procedures and are part of the legislative programme;
- 15.38% of measures, 2 measure, are planned to be implemented during the remainder of the year.

Of all measures in this chapter, 4 (30.76%) of them were planned to be implemented during the first quarter: 3 legislative measures and 1 implementing measure.

Chart 1.1.2.2. Implementation of NPISAA during January – March 2022: Public Administration – measures planned for this quarter




Regarding implementation of measures planned to be implemented during the first quarter, findings indicate that none of the 4 measures planned has been fully implemented, i.e. all face with serious delays.

As the findings of the report indicate, this sector has serious delays in implementation, as none of the planned measures have been implemented. Although the draft-law on salaries in the public sector and that on public officials has been finalized, they are still under consultation phase and are expected to be sent to the Government for approval during the second quarter. Whereas, the draft-law on administrative inspection has been finalized by the working team, preliminary and public consultations have been completed, and will soon be sent to the Government for approval. The draft-law on harmonization of special laws with the Law on General Administrative Procedure (LGAP) has also been finalized and has passed all stages of consultations. This draft-law, aimed at eliminating legal uncertainties which are presented in the large number of special procedures and provides for the harmonization of about 50 special laws with the LGAP (at least 20% of existing draft-laws), is expected to be sent soon to the Government for approval.

## 1.1.3. Ombudsperson

This chapter contains 2 implementing measures; no measure has been planned to be implemented during the first quarter.

Chart 1.1.3.1. Implementation of NPISAA during January - March 2022: Ombudsperson - all measures



Regarding the implementation of this chapter until the end of the first quarter, findings indicate that 2 measures planned are under implementation, as planned.

As the findings of the report indicate, this sector generally has no delays and the planned measures are under implementation. Regarding the number of OI recommendations implemented by the responsible authorities, indicator 7.3.2 of the Sectoral Budget Contract for PAR has been achieved. At least 60% of all recommendations addressed to Government institutions - issued in 2019 and 2021, to which they responded positively - have been implemented. According to the data provided by the Ombudsperson Institution, 116 out of 213 recommendations have been implemented, which means that the level of implementation of the recommendations, indicators 7.3.2 has reached 75%.

Regarding the number of responses received from the responsible authorities, the Ombudsperson during the period January 1 to March 31, 2022, has addressed a total of 5 recommendations: of them, for 4 recommendations received responses within the legal deadline of 30 days, and for 1 recommendation received no response. Therefore, it is considered that the measure is under implementation, as planned.

## 1.1.4. Civilian Oversight of Security Forces

This chapter does not contain any measures.

## 1.2. Regional Cooperation and International Obligations

This chapter does not contain any measures.

## 2. BLOCK 2: ECONOMIC CRITERIA

## 2.1. Existence of a Functioning Market Economy

This chapter contains 2 implementing measures; no measure has been planned to be implemented during the first quarter.

Chart 2.1.1. Implementation of NPISAA during January – March 2022: Existence of a Functioning Market Economy – all measures



Regarding the implementation of this chapter until the end of the first quarter, findings indicate as follows:

- 50% of measures, 1 measure, is under implementation, as planned;
- 50% of measures, 1 measure, faces minor delays. This measure is as follows:
  - Adoption of the concept document on amending the Law on Public Owned Enterprises.

As the findings of the report indicate, this sector generally has no serious delays and the planned measures are under implementation. A small delay presented above is related to the adoption of the Concept Document for amending and supplementing the Law on Publicly Owned Enterprises, as preparations for this Concept Document have not yet begun, although the deadline for adoption is September 2022.

## 2.2. Capacity to Cope with Competitive Pressure and Market Forces within the Union

This chapter contains 1 implementing measure; this measure was not planned to be implemented during the first quarter.

Regarding the implementation of this chapter until the end of the first quarter, the findings indicate that 7 planned measures are under implementation, as planned.

As the findings of the report indicate, this sector generally has no delays and the planned measures are under implementation.

This chapter contains 1 implementing measure; this measure was not planned to be implemented during the first quarter

Regarding the implementation of this measure until the end of the first quarter, the findings indicate that 1 measure planned is under implementation, as planned.

As the findings of the report indicate, the planned measure is under implementation.

This chapter contains 4 measures: 2 (50%) legislative measures and 2 (50%) implementing measures.

Of all measures in this chapter, 1 implementing measure (25% of measures) was planned to be implemented during the first quarter.

## 3.4. Acquis Chapter 4: Free Movement of Capital

This chapter contains 2 implementing measures; no measures were planned to be implemented during the first quarter.

Regarding the implementation of this chapter until the end of the first quarter, the findings show that both planned measures face slight delays. These measures are the following:


- Adoption of the concept document on preventing money laundering and combating terrorist financing;
- Establishment of a special team or organizational unit within the Financial Intelligence Unit for strategic analysis.

As the findings of the report indicate, in this sector the planned measures are under implementation. A slight delay presented above is related to the Concept Document on the treatment of legislation in the field of preventing money laundering and combating terrorist financing (PML/CTF). The meeting of the Working Group was held on 25 March 2022, where the final draft of the Concept Document was discussed, as well as the presentation of the recommendations of the Council of Europe Expert regarding new developments in the field of AML/LFT and the approximation of the Concept Document with EU Directives. Regarding the other measure, the establishment of special teams for the development of strategic analysis has been initiated. This will include filling vacancies in the FIU-K that will be completed in order to strengthen strategic analysis.

#### 3.5. Acquis Chapter 5: Public Procurement

This chapter contains 2 measures: 1 (50%) legislative measure and 1 (50%) implementing measure; no measures were planned to be implemented during the first quarter.

Regarding the implementation of this chapter until the end of the first quarter, findings indicate as follows:

- 50% of measures, 1 measure, is under implementation, according to the plan;
- 50% of measures, 1 measure, are planned to be implemented during the remainder of the year.


As the findings of the report indicate, in this sector the planned measures are under implementation. In order to achieve the approval of the draft-law on public procurement within the set deadline, the working group agreed to complete internal consultations and then public consultations with relevant stakeholders by the end of May and the draft to be submitted to the Government for approval at the end of June 2022. Regarding the next measure, planned

for the rest of the year, the Memorandum of Understanding between the PPRC and the Competition Authority will be signed after the appointment of the new ACA Board.

## 3.6. Acquis Chapter 6: Company Law

This chapter contains 3 measures: 1 (33.33%) legislative measure and 2 (66.67%) implementing measures; no measures were planned to be implemented during the first quarter.

Regarding the implementation of this chapter until the end of the first quarter, findings indicate as follows:


- 66.67% of measures, 2 measures, are under implementation, as planned;
- 33.33% of measures, 1 measure, face slight delays. This measure is as follows:
  - o Draft analysis of the compliance of the existing platform with the requirements of the BRIS.

As the findings of the report indicate, this sector generally has no serious delays and the planned measures are under implementation. A delay has arisen regarding the drafting of the BRIS compliance analysis, as officials are still looking for a qualified expert.

#### 3.7. Acquis Chapter 7: Intellectual Property Law

This chapter contains 4 (100%) implementing measures; no measures were planned to be implemented during the first quarter.

Regarding the implementation of this chapter until the end of the first quarter, findings indicate as follows:

- 50% of measures, 2 measures, are under implementation, as planned;
- 50% of measures, 2 measures, face slight delays. These measures are the following:
  - Adoption of the strategy on industrial property;
  - o Implementation of collective licensing agreements.

As the findings of the report indicate, this sector generally has no serious delays and the planned measures are under implementation. Minor delays have occurred regarding the adoption of the Strategy on Industrial Property as well as the implementation of collective licensing agreements.

## 3.8. Acquis Chapter 8: Competition Policy

This chapter contains 5 measures: 2 (40%) legislative measures and 3 (60%) implementing measures; no measures were planned to be implemented during the first quarter.

Diagram 3.8.1. Implementation of NPISAA during January - March 2022: Competition Policy - all measures




Regarding the implementation of this chapter until the end of the first quarter, the findings show that the 5 planned measures are under implementation, as planned.

As the findings of the report show, this sector generally has no serious delays and the planned measures are under implementation.

This chapter contains 15 measures: 12 (80%) legislative measures and 3 (20%) implementing measures.

Regarding the implementation of this chapter until the end of the first quarter, findings indicate as follows:

- 6.67% of measures, 1 measure, have been fully implemented;
- 66.67% of measures, 10 measures, are under implementation, as planned;
- 13.33% of measures, 2 measures, face slight delays. These measures are the following:
  - Adoption of the regulation on commercial audio-visual communications;
  - Adoption of the regulation on the ownership and concentration of audio and audio-visual media services;
- 13.33% of measures, 2 measures, face serious delays. These measures are the following:
  - Adoption of the regulation on the protection of children and minors in audio and audio-visual media services;
  - Adoption of the regulation for dispute resolution.

Of all measures in this chapter, 3 legislative measures (20% of them) were planned to be implemented during the first quarter.

Regarding the implementation of the measures planned to be implemented during the first quarter, findings indicate as follows:

- 33.33% of measures, 1 measure, have been fully implemented;
- 66.67% of measures, 2 measures, have not been fully implemented yet, so they face serious delays.

As the report's findings show, this sector generally does not face serious delays. However, special attention should be paid to the adoption of secondary legislation, namely regulations in the field of electronic communications and audiovisual policy which are planned to be adopted/implemented during 2022. Therefore, during the next quarter, institutions should intensify their commitment to implementation of all measures foreseen for the next quarter and those measures that were not fulfilled during the first quarter.

#### 3.11. Acquis Chapter 11: Agriculture and Rural Development

This chapter contains 5 measures: 1 (20%) legislative measure and 4 (80%) implementing measure.

Regarding the implementation of this chapter until the end of the first quarter, findings indicate as follows:

- 40% of measures, 2 measures, have been fully implemented;
- 40% of measures, 2 measures, are under implementation, as planned;
- 20% of measures, 1 measure, face serious delays. This measure is as follows:
  - Adoption of the programme for agriculture and rural development 2022-2028.

Of all measures in this chapter, 3 implementing measures (60% of them) were planned to be implemented during the first quarter.

Regarding the implementation of the measures planned to be implemented during the first quarter, findings indicate as follows:

- 66.67% of measures, 2 measures, have been fully implemented;
- 33.33% of measures, 1 measure, has not been implemented yet, and is facing serious delays.

As the findings of the report indicate, most of the measures planned to be implemented in this sector have been implemented or are under implementation. However, as presented above, the adoption of the Agriculture and Rural Development Programme faces serious delays. The compilation of this Programme has been finalized, identifying 13 measures to address the objectives of the ARDP for the seven-year period which will be implemented gradually over the years. However, the Ministry is waiting for the project funded by ZBEK to evaluate the ex-ante report for this Program, in which case for administrative reasons there are delays.

#### 3.12. Acquis Chapter 12: Food Safety, Veterinary, and Phytosanitary Policy

This chapter contains 6 measures: 2 (33.33%) legislative measures and 4 (66.67%) implementing measures.

Regarding the implementation of this chapter until the end of the first quarter, findings indicate as follows:

- 33.33% of measures, 2 measures, have been fully implemented;
- 33.33% of measures, 2 measures, are under implementation, as planned;
- 16.67% of measures, 1 measure, face slight delays. This measure is as follows:
  - Adoption of the concept document for veterinary medicine;
- 16.67% of measures, 1 measure, face serious delays. This measure is as follows:
  - Adoption of the AI on the definition of health rules for animal by-products and their derivatives, which are not intended for human consumption (new sub-legal act).

Of all measures in this chapter, 2 (33.33%) of them were planned to be implemented during the first quarter: 1 legislative measure and 1 implementing measure.

Regarding the implementation of the measures planned to be implemented during the first quarter, findings indicate as follows:

- 50% of measures, 1 measure, have been fully implemented;
- 50% of measures, 1 measure, has not been implemented yet, and is facing serious delays. This
  measure is as follows:
  - Adoption of the AI on the definition of health rules for animal by-products and their derivatives which are not intended for human consumption.

As the findings of the report show, most of the planned measures in this sector have been implemented or are under implementation. A slight delay presented above is related to the adoption of the concept document for veterinary medicine, as the working group was established on 8 February 2022, but have not yet met to begin its drafting. Further, there are serious delays in the adoption of the AI on setting health rules for animal by-products and their derivatives which are not intended for human consumption. The adoption of this AI would help in the functioning of the factory for the processing of animal by-products, therefore special attention should be paid to it.

## 3.13. Acquis Chapter 13: Fisheries

This chapter does not contain short-term measures.

## 3.14. Acquis Chapter 14: Transport Policy

This chapter contains 19 measures: 15 (78.95%) legislative measures and 4 (21.05%) implementing measures

Regarding the implementation of this chapter until the end of the first quarter, findings indicate as follows:

- 52.63% of measures, 10 measures, are under implementation, as planned;
- 16.79% of measures, 3 measures, face slight delays. These measures are the following:
  - Approval by the Government of the draft-law on road transport;
  - Adoption of the regulation amending the Regulation No. 9/2017 Regarding the Common European Risk Classification Scheme;
  - Completion of the draft design for the rehabilitation and modernization of the third phase of the X railway line.
- 31.58% of measures, 6 measures, face serious delays. These measures are the following:
  - o Adoption of AI for technical control of vehicles;
  - o Adoption of AI for mobile technical control;
  - Adoption of Regulation (CAA) amending Regulation No. 05/2015 regarding the automatic validity of Union flight crew licenses and take-off and landing training;
  - Adoption of Regulation (CAA) amending Regulation No. 05/2015 in relation to the declared training organizations;
  - Adoption of Regulation (CAA) amending regulation No. 05/2015 laying down technical requirements and administrative procedures relating to civil aviation air crew in accordance with Regulation (CAA) No. 05/2020;
  - Adoption of Regulation (CAA) amending Regulation No. 05/2015 laying down the technical requirements and administrative procedures relating to civil aviation air crew in accordance with Regulation (CAA) 05/2020 of the European Parliament and of the Council.

Whereas, out of all the measures of the chapter, 6 legislative measures (31.58% of them) were planned to be implemented during the first quarter.

Diagram 3.14.2. Implementation of NPISAA during January - March 2022: Transport Policy - measures planned for this quarter




Regarding the implementation of the measures planned to be implemented during the first quarter, the findings show that none of the 6 planned measures has been fully implemented, so all face serious delays.

As the findings of the report indicate, this sector faces serious delays which stem from the legislative measures mentioned above. Consequently, the responsible institutions should pay special attention to the process of drafting laws, AIs and regulations which are planned to be adopted/implemented during 2022. Therefore, during the following quarter, the institutions should intensify their commitment to the implementation of all measures foreseen for the next quarter and those measures that have not been fulfilled for the first reporting quarter (Q1 2022).

This chapter contains 8 measures: 3 (37.5%) legislative measures and 5 (62.5%) implementing measures.

Diagram 3.15.1.Implementation of NPISAA during January - March 2022: Energy - all measures




Regarding the implementation of this chapter until the end of the first quarter, findings indicate as follows:

Diagram 3.15.2.Implementation of NPISAA during January - March 2022: Energy - measures planned for this quarter









  - o Approval by the Government of the draft-law amending the Law No. 04/L-161 on Safety and Health at Work.

As the findings of the report indicate, this sector generally has no serious delays and the planned measures are under implementation. A delay presented above is related to the adoption of two basic laws for the employment sector: the Draft-law on Labour and the one amending Law No. 04/L-161 on Safety and Health at Work.

Diagram 3.23.2. Implementation of NPISAA during January - March 2022: Judiciary and fundamental rights - measures planned for this quarter





Diagram 3.24.1. Implementation of NPISAA during January - March 2022: Justice, freedom and security - all measures



Diagram 3.25.1. Implementation of NPISAA during January - March 2022: Science and Research - all measures





Diagram 3.25.2. Implementation of NPISAA during January - March 2022: Science and Research - measures planned for the first quarter





Diagram 3.26.1. Implementation of NPISAA during January - March 2022: Education and Culture - all measures





Diagram 3.27.1.Implementation of NPISAA during January - March 2022: Environment - all measures



- 22.22% of measures, 2 measures, face serious delays. These measures are the following:
  - Amendment of the AI on the conditions, manners, parameters, and limiting values of wastewater discharge in the public sewerage network and in the water body;
  - o Adoption of the Action Plan 2022-2024 for the Strategy on the Development of Forestry 2022 2030.

Of all measures in this chapter, 2 (22.22%) of them were planned to be implemented during the first quarter: 1 legislative measure and 1 implementing measure.

Regarding the implementation of the measures planned to be implemented during the first quarter, the findings show that neither of the 2 planned measures has been implemented, so they all facing serious delays.

While, regarding the measures that are expected to face challenges and delays and that require attention in the rest of the year for this chapter, it is worth mentioning that in addition to the two above mentioned measures that have not managed to be implemented according to plan is the Draft-law on Waters of Kosovo which is facing minor delays.

## 3.28. Acquis Chapter 28: Consumer and Health Protection

This chapter contains 7 measures: 5 (71.42%) legislative measures and 2 (28.58%) implementing measures.

Regarding the implementation of this chapter until the end of the first quarter, findings indicate as follows:

- 57.14% of measures, 4 measures, are under implementation, as planned;
- 14.29% of measures, 1 measure, is with small delays,
- 28.57% of measures, 2 measures, are with serious delays:
  - o Adoption of the strategic plan for prevention and control of communicable diseases;
  - Draft AI on the implementation of exemption from payment of premiums, co-payments, and co-financing for health services.

Of all measures in this chapter, 1 implementing measure (14.29% of them) was planned to be implemented during the first quarter.

Regarding the implementation of the measures planned to be implemented during the first quarter, the findings show that 1 planned measure has not been implemented, and is facing serious delays.

There are serious delays in the field of health, in the adoption of the strategic plan for the prevention and control of communicable diseases and the drafting of the AI for the implementation of the exemption from payment of premiums, co-payments, and co-financing for health services.

Regarding the implementation of this chapter until the end of the first quarter, findings indicate as follows:


- 66.67% of measures, 2 measures, are under implementation, as planned;

Diagram 3.30.1. Implementation of NPISAA during January - March 2022: External Relations - all measures





MFAD has finalized the draft-law on the implementation of targeted international financial sanctions, which is expected to be approved by the end of April. Implementing measures are planned to be implemented in the future.
